As a private, not-for-profit organization, we cannot do it alone. We receive funding from federal, state and county contracts, United Way, and client fees, but could not continue providing many services without the support of corporate, foundation and individual donations. Critical services such as Child and Family Counseling and Child Advocacy Centers are only partially funded by sustainable revenue streams and require financial support from other sources. Private donations help us improve the health of our most atrisk children and families across the state. 5 PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS Family Preservation and Support The Family Preservation and Support (FP&S) services include responsibility for Home Visiting, Community Response, Education and Employment Specialists, Family Support, and group based services in Family Resource Centers. The FP&S area works with children at-risk for abuse and neglect and their caregivers to reduce the likelihood of maltreatment and to strengthen family functioning. Child and Family Counseling The Child and Family Counseling (CFC) program provides individual, family, and group therapy, in various clinic, community, and school-based settings as well as psychological evaluations and psychiatric medication management. Children's therapists are skilled at assisting children who have experienced trauma and witnessed domestic violence, in addition to other disorders of childhood and adolescence.

A Child Advocacy Center (CAC) is a safe place for children and adolescents who may have been abused. Each center's child-friendly space was designed to help children

and families feel supported, comfortable, and safe throughout their time at the CAC. The center brings together a team of specially trained professionals who evaluate and investigate cases of child abuse and help children and their families.

The Out-of-Home Care (OOH) services include responsibility for Treatment Foster

Purchase of Service Respite Care, Project Home/Permanency Planning, and Foster Home Licensing. Statewide offices allow Children's to recruit, license, and train foster parents for children and youth with significant emotional, behavioral, or medical

Children's provides child welfare services in Milwaukee County under contract with the Department of Children and Families. Children's provides effective and intensive services to families where children have either been abused or neglected or where they have been determined to be unsafe in the care of their parents. Services focus

on providing for the safety, permanence, and well-being of each child in care.
