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As a survivor of cancer or bone marrow transplant (BMT), you may wonder about health and well-being in the future. Children's Wisconsin has programs to help you transition from active treatment through survivorship.

Next Steps Clinic

At the Next Steps Clinic, a team specializes in the care of cancer and BMT survivors. The team includes: physicians, advanced practice providers, nurse educators, psychologists, social workers, dietitians, teachers, fertility navigators, and survivorship community navigators. These team members are experts in helping survivors and their families.

The Next Steps team will:

- Check for possible effects of treatment and create a plan to address them.
- Teach survivors about the treatment they received and what it may mean for future care.
- Review healthy lifestyle behaviors and good nutrition.
- Offer community resources for school, work, and social issues.
- Answer questions about having children.
- Create a complete summary of treatment and ongoing needs for the survivor and their primary care doctor.

Your first visit will include all team members. Future visits may include some or all of the team members. This will depend on the survivor's individual needs.

Next Steps Clinic is open to:

- Survivors diagnosed before age 30, no matter what their current age is.
- Survivors who had a bone marrow transplant more than two years ago.
- Cancer survivors who completed treatment at least two to five years ago. It will depend on the type of cancer.
- Any survivor, no matter where they had treatments.
