

Transition to Adulthood: Insurance



Insurance coverage may change when you:

- Turn 18 years old. With Medicaid, you may have coverage until age 19 years.
- Get a job.
- When you have moved out of your family home.

What type of Insurance do you have now?

Private:

- Read the policy. Find out what coverage will be after you are 18 (19 with Medicaid) years old. Look on your insurance website or call Customer Service.

Government (Medicaid T19, BadgerCare, HMO) or Medicare. If you have no insurance and you are a legal citizen, contact:

How can you keep your health insurance as an adult?

- Check into insurance coverage benefits **before** you turn 18 (or 19).
- If you have a disability it will need to be reviewed again as an adult.

For private Insurance

- You can stay on your parents' insurance until you are 26
- You might qualify if it is determined you have a disability. Check with the insurance plan. Coverage may go beyond age 26 if the child in need continues to be both:
 - Unable to hold a job because of intellectual or physical disability; and
 - Dependent on the insured person for support and care.
- If you have a job, you may be able to get insurance through your employer. It is important to ask about insurance benefits when you apply for jobs.

For government insurance

- You will stay on Medicaid (T19, BadgerCare, HMO) or Medicare as long as your disability is verified and qualifies for coverage.

If no insurance and you are a legal citizen

- You may apply for SSI Disability (SSDI) or Medicaid as an adult.
