
2024 Community Benefits Overview

At Children's Wisconsin, we recognize our role and responsibility in improving community health. We are committed to investing our resources to ensure children and families receive the care, education and support they need to be healthy and well.

Children's Wisconsin is proud to offer many programs and services that positively impact the health of Wisconsin residents. This report provides an overview of investments Children's Wisconsin makes in our programs and services to address community health and well-being. While not represented in this report, grants and generous gifts from individual, corporate, government and foundation benefactors are critical to supporting our programs and services. community benefit investments are a piece of our community's efforts to improve kids' health. We are grateful to partner with many community organizations, working collaboratively to achieve our common goals.

In 2024, Children's Wisconsin invested more than \$189 million in community benefits. This includes providing \$102 million in uncompensated care for kids covered by Medicaid and families burdened by systemic health inequities to ensure they have access to high-quality health care. Children's Wisconsin community benefit investments are especially important to ensure that all children have the opportunity to achieve positive physical, mental, dental and social health outcomes. We continue to invest in and serve our community because kids deserve the best.

Our community benefit activities respond to and address community needs and aim to improve the health and well-being of residents across Wisconsin. Listed below are Children's Wisconsin investments in core areas identified by the IRS, such as serving those covered by Medicaid, training the next generation of the pediatric workforce, supporting research and improving community health.

Children's Wisconsin Investments In:



Caring for those covered by Medicaid: \$102,000,556

 When government payments received are less than the cost of providing care to those covered by Medicaid



Health professions education: \$30,801,881

• Training pediatric residents and fellows and supporting students, interns and other health professions education



Subsidized health services: \$28,113,302

• Clinical programs and services that meet an identified community need, particularly for some of our most vulnerable children, and whose revenues do not exceed the cost of care



Community health improvement services: \$14,091,780

• Services, programs and education that extend beyond patient care activities to help keep kids, families and communities healthy and safe



Research: \$9,763,951

 Pediatric clinical and community health research and studies conducted through Children's Research Institute



 While most children in Wisconsin have access to health insurance through public or private options, Children's Wisconsin provides free or discounted health services to those who meet our financial assistance policy criteria.

Financial and in-kind contributions: \$851,253

 Children's Wisconsin supports local organizations and important causes that positively impact our community, through both financial contributions and staff participation on community boards and committees addressing community health issues.

Community-building activities: \$170,013

 Children's Wisconsin support of coalitions, initiatives and organizations working to improve the community, including addressing economic self-sufficiency, housing stability, community and public health efforts, and workforce development, among other issues
