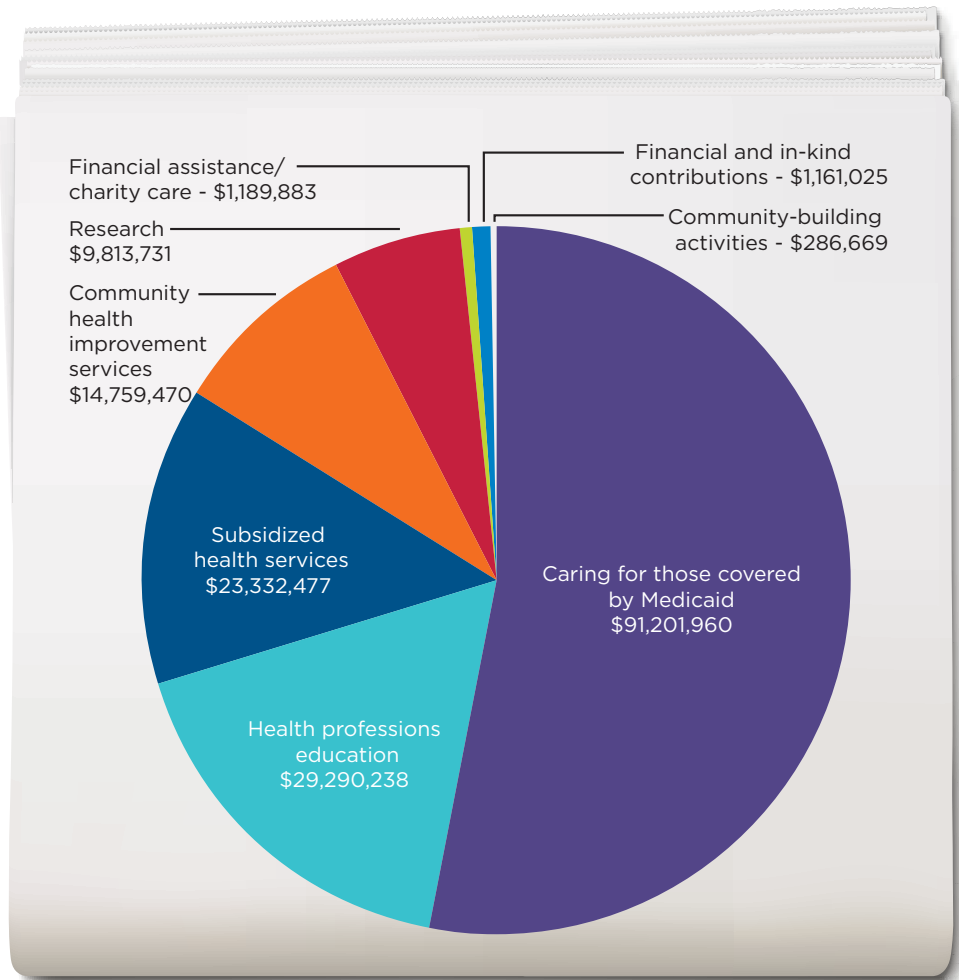


2022 Community Benefits Overview

At Children's Wisconsin, we recognize our role and responsibility in improving community health. We are committed to investing our resources to ensure children and families receive the care, education and support they need to be healthy and well.

Children's is proud to offer many programs and services that positively impact the health of Wisconsin residents. While this report provides an overview of solely Children's investment in addressing community health, we also rely on the generosity of our many individual, corporate, government and foundation donors. These gifts and grants not only allow us to provide the best care, advocacy, research and education, but also help support many of our programs and services that are critical to improving community health and well-being. In addition, we are grateful to partner with many community organizations, working collaboratively to achieve our common goals.



In 2022, Children's invested more than \$171 million in community benefits. This includes providing \$91.2 million in unreimbursed care to ensure kids have access to high-quality, pediatric-focused health care, especially for those covered by Medicaid and children burdened by systemic health inequities. With additional support from our donors, we continue to invest in and serve our community because kids deserve the best.

Our community benefit activities respond to and address community needs and aim to improve the health and well-being of residents across Wisconsin. Listed below are Children's investments in core areas identified by the IRS, such as serving those covered by Medicaid, training the next generation of the pediatric workforce, supporting research and improving community health.

Children's investments in:



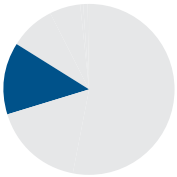
Caring for those covered by Medicaid: \$91,201,960

- When government payments received are less than the cost of providing care to those covered by Medicaid



Health professions education: \$29,290,238

- Training pediatric residents and fellows and supporting students, interns and other health professions education



Subsidized health services: \$23,332,477

- Clinical programs and services that meet an identified community need, particularly for some of our most vulnerable children, and whose revenues do not exceed the cost of care



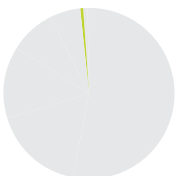
Community health improvement services: \$14,759,470

- Services, programs and education that extend beyond patient care activities to help keep kids, families and communities healthy and safe



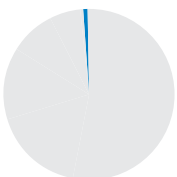
Research: \$9,813,731

- Pediatric clinical and community health research and studies conducted through Children's Research Institute



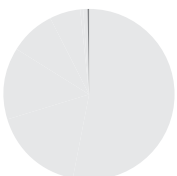
Financial assistance/charity care: \$1,189,883

- While most children in Wisconsin have access to health insurance through public or private options, Children's provides free or discounted health services to those who meet our financial assistance policy criteria.



Financial and in-kind contributions: \$1,161,025

- Children's supports local organizations and important causes that positively impact our community, through both financial contributions and staff participation on community boards and committees addressing community health issues.



Community-building activities: \$286,669

- Children's support of coalitions, initiatives and organizations working to improve the community, including addressing economic self-sufficiency, housing stability, community and public health efforts, and workforce development, among other issues.
