Planning

for Adulthood: Contact the CYSHCN Regional Center

Youth ages 14-21 with disabilities and their families can receive help planning for the transition to adulthood. Activities include moving from a pediatrician to an adult health provider and exploring opportunities in education, work and community living. Examples include: WI Division for Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR), Department of Public Instruction (DPI) and Independent Living Centers.

Advocacy and Parent Training: Contact the CYSHCN Regional Center

State and local agencies provide information and assistance for families looking for information on how to best understand, protect and advance the legal, human and service rights of children and youth. Examples include legal assistance, help with an IEP and health benefits counseling. Parent training groups help parents learn about resources and how to be a good advocate for their children.

Resource Roadmap for Mental Health Services Southeastern Regional Center for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs (CYSHCN)

Public schools are required to provide special education and related services to children who are eligible. The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) is the federal special education law that covers children ages 3-21. A team of parents and school staff will create a written plan of services called an Individual Education Program (IEP) to determine how to best support the child. Advocacy agencies such as WI FACETS (Family Assistance Center for Education, Training and Support) can provide information and assistance to parents who questions or concerns have related to opportunities in education.
