# Vacuum Assisted Closure (V.A.C.) Therapy



## Using an ACTIV.A.C.™ for wound care at home


## What is V.A.C.® Therapy?

V.A.C. Therapy helps a wound heal. It is a system with a soft vacuum in it. The system:

- Helps close the wound.
- Removes fluids from the wound.
- Limits the need for daily dressing changes.

## The system has five parts:

- 1. A therapy unit or machine.
- 2. Foam dressings. The dressing goes on or inside the wound.
- 3. Clear adhesive drape. The drape covers the dressing.
- Plastic tubing. One end of the tubing connects to the dressing.
  The other end connects to the canister that fits into the unit
- 5. Canister.





Canister

When the dressing is first put on, some children feel a mild pulling. This is normal. After a few minutes, this goes away.

## What do I need to know about using the ACTIV.A.C. Therapy unit at home?

- You are **renting** this machine. It must be returned after the therapy is done.
- Check the dressing. Be sure the foam dressing stays shrunk down. It should look like a wrinkled raisin.
  - If it does not look like a wrinkled raisin, call the clinic. If it is after hours, call the doctor on call or come to the Emergency Department.
- Make sure the machine is running when the dressing is on.
  - Never turn it off for more than two hours.
  - Do not change the settings.

## Other things to remember about the unit

- It has a 14-hour battery life.
- Use a three-prong electrical outlet with this unit.
- Keep the unit in the carrying case at all times.
- The unit should be upright with the touch screen facing up.
- Do not get the unit wet.

#### Safety

- Be careful that no one trips on the extra tubing and electrical cord.
- Be careful that the tubing does not catch on anything.

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### System alarm

V.A.C. Therapy unit has alarms that you can see and hear. They will alert you to a potential problem. Most often, the reason for the alarm is easily fixed. For information on alerts and alarms, refer to the documents that came with your unit.

- Call The KCI Product Issue Response team at 1-800-275-4524.
- If KCI cannot solve the problem, call the clinic during the day time if this occurs. After hours, call the doctor on call or come to the Emergency Department.

## Activity

- Your child's ability to move around depends on their condition and the reason for the VAC Therapy.
- See the After Visit Summary (AVS) for your child's activity level.

## What do I do with the unit when it is no longer needed?

- When your doctor has decided the VAC. Therapy is no longer needed, call KCI at 1-800-275-4524 within 24 hours to start the return process.
- Tell the KCI representative:
  - Your child's name and phone number.
  - The date therapy ended.
- You will need to mail back the ACTIV.A.C. machine.

**ALERT:** Call your child's doctor, nurse, or clinic if you have any questions or concerns or if your child has:

- A fever of 101.5° F (38.6°C).
- More pain at the wound.
- Bloody drainage or more drainage than your doctor told you about, in the VAC tubing.
- The V.A.C. dressing comes off.
- Pus or a bad smell from the wound.
- More redness or warmth around the wound.
- Special health care needs that were not covered by this information.

#### Also call if:

- The foam dressing does not stay shrunk down and it does not look like a wrinkled raisin.
- You are having problems with the VAC Therapy machine.
- The VAC Therapy has been turned off for more than two hours.
