

How do I contact my child's school if my child is a victim of bullying?

When you are ready to contact your child's school, it is best to follow a chain of command.

1. School counselor or social worker

Try to call them at a time when he or she can talk, usually before or after school.

2. School principal

If the school counselor or social worker doesn't resolve your concerns, call the school principal. Provide him or her with the same information you gave the school counselor or social worker.

3. School superintendent

If you feel that your concerns still have not been addressed, call your school district and ask to speak to the school superintendent. Provide him or her with the same information you previously shared with your child's school, as well as what has or has not been done in response to your concerns.

There are a few things to keep in mind when contacting your child's school.

- Be respectful and stay calm. Your message will be received more positively if
 you are not shouting, name-calling or using inappropriate language. Because
 bullying is an emotional issue, it may be helpful to write down ahead of time what
 you want to say so you don't forget any details and you stay calm in your
 delivery.
- School staff may not be able to tell you certain details. Due to the Family
 Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), school staff cannot share school
 records of students involved in bullying incidents. However, per Wisconsin state
 law, the school is required to have a plan in place for investigating the bullying
 incident, filing a report and disciplining the students who are at fault.
